My Story - Elaine Ferguson

In a little village on the big island of Wrangell Alaska, there was a little white house with a front porch on Church Street. When we moved there, I was about 3 and my brother 2. My favorite memory of living there, is that after dinner dad would put us in the crabapple tree in the front yard and go inside to help mom with the dishes.



We were too small to get down out of the tree; but, could spend hours climbing around its branches or just sitting viewing our world from our exalted position. Years later, after my brother had climbed the corporate ladder and I still climbed trees and construction scaffolding, I went back and discovered how tiny that tree really is.

When I was 11, I earned 25 cents an hour babysitting a 2-year-old boy and his 3-month old sister, doing their meals and laundry too. I had to buy my school clothes with my meager earnings. My grandmother sent me a pattern and material for a full circle skirt, so I learned to sew. Patterns cost 25 cents, so I decided I could make my own. My first project was a yellow 'scarf' blouse. It had triangular sleeves and a scarf collar. I had no idea at that time that I was teaching my brain to design in two dimensions something that would be in three dimensions, a skill I put to use many years later designing houses.

I was sent to college to get my Mrs. It took two years. My husband decreed "No kids and no pets!" Well, I got pregnant on the train to his first duty station in Georgia. We had three kids and numerous pets and had moved to California after making homes in many states and Sicily. I became active in church and PTA and began selling World Book Encyclopedia door to door, doing quite well after my manager convinced me I was smart (not a "stupid illogical woman"). I learned to talk to people with confidence. After 20 years, I managed to escape that abusive marriage.

I left him for a penniless older man who treasured me, made me think I had value. So, I grew. My dream man had been someone who would tell me what to do, to think, and to believe so I wouldn't have to make decisions. Instead, my new husband needed me to tell him those things. So, I grew. I discovered I could make good decisions. I was good at planning and organizing. Because he was a contractor, I channeled my love of art into designing houses, making it a 35year career. In building our own house, we'd come to a project like laying vinyl flooring. I'd say, "We need a professional for this." He would say, "You're a professional, you can do it." I learned to lay flooring, cut and finish drywall, do roofing, and decorative things like gold leafing and marbling. I always did the finish work, as he wasn't precise enough to suit me. Besides, trim used smaller nails. I did learn to drive16-penny nails without curling them.

After 35 happy years of ballroom and square dancing, traveling and building together, my husband had a stroke. Then I had to do everything. I would drive to the store and sit in the car and cry, because he had always done the shopping as I hated it. Once I was grocery shopping and my list disappeared. I caught my breath: "Oh, I lost my list" escaped my mouth. Then a voice in the next aisle said, "Would you like to borrow mine?" So shopping became not so distressing. (cont.)

Several times in my life I've gone back to school. First, I finished my BA and taught Special Ed for a few years. I went back again to study architecture. I had a client who had lived in the U.S. for 50 years and still couldn't speak English, so I decided I needed to learn Spanish. School was a lot more fun as an adult. As a kid, grades were so important. I was 68 when I last returned to school to learn AutoCAD.

While nursing my husband in his later years, I taught myself to make quilts. Some were bed quilts; but, I love making landscape quilts. It's painting with fabric as the medium. When my husband died at 96, I went back to dancing. A year and a half and four partners later I found my third mate. He is an elegant ballroom dancer and learned to square dance with me.

I think the most important things I've learned are: conquer your fears. Don't let them master you. If you face them, work through them, you'll discover they weren't as bad as you thought. A fellow writer once said to me:" "I see why you are so good at so many things. You just keep at them until you get good." That's the second lesson. The harder something is, the greater your joy in mastering it.
