Our Story - Bill and Nancy Armstrong

Bill was raised primarily in the Eastern part of San Diego County as the second of nine children by his schoolteacher father and for obvious reasons, stay at home mother. Because money was short he worked his way through high school and almost two years of college before a series of events which shaped their future took place. In 1965, he dropped a college class which took him below the magic number of 12 units which were required to keep you out of the draft. This was right at the start of a major build up of forces in Vietnam and less than thirty days after dropping the class he had his draft notice. Bill opted to enlist in the Air Force rather than go into the Army. Eventually being stationed at McConnell Air Force Base in the foreign land of Wichita, Kansas. Little did he know that waiting nearby was the beautiful girl that he would spend his life with.

Nancy was raised as the second of six children on a farm owned by her extended family near Burlingame, Kansas which Bill always describes as being two grain elevators Southwest of Topeka. Many people are surprised to learn that Nancy first learned to drive on a tractor at about age 12 and spent most of her non-school hours doing farm related chores. During high school she worked behind the soda fountain in the local drug store and still makes a great pineapple soda. After high school with the help of an uncle she received a scholarship from a business college in Wichita, which included working as a nanny for a prominent family in return for room and board. Little did she know that lurking nearby was an Airman who couldn't wait to meet her.

It wasn't exactly a blind date for Bill since he had spotted her from a distance while both were visiting a friend. He later asked his friend who the girl in the blue shorts was. Turns out Nancy and his girlfriend went to school together. As luck would have it, Nancy had just broken up with some sad Kansas boy and agreed to meet Bill. Having grown up a Methodist near an Air Force Base, there were two kinds of guys she wasn't supposed to date, Air Force guys and Catholics. Since Bill represented both groups, that made him especially attractive to her. They hit it off immediately, he was attracted to her beauty and winning personality and she, according to her, was most impressed by the fact that he lived less than 100 miles from Disneyland!

After a short, and dare I say passionate courtship, they were married on March 16^{th,} 1968 at the chapel on McConnell Air Force Base. Their honeymoon consisted of one night at The Lassen Hotel in Wichita, where Nancy fell asleep almost immediately and Bill watched an old movie on black & white T.V. Thus began a 53 year saga that continues to this day.

After being discharged in 1969, they left the prairie behind and settled for a short time in El Cajon where they both quickly found work. Bill as the office manager for a Mobile Home Dealership and Nancy in the accounting department for Travelodge. Only a couple years later after saving the incredible sum of \$6,000 dollars they opened their own Mobile Home dealership in Agoura Hills. Nancy was very reluctant to sign an inventory loan for \$100,000 with The General Electric Credit Corporation, but as Bill explained, "well if we can't pay it back, I'm pretty sure they won't eat us". This began 50 years of adventures and misadventures in the business world that included time in the Mobile Home industry, Recreational Vehicles, Auto parts and eventually led to our business of the past 20 years as General Contractors. Through it all, we worked side by side and only occasionally would an exasperated but loving Nancy would say "Can't you just get a job?"

Our son Steve was born in 1972 and 5 years later our second son, Scott arrived on the scene. We enjoyed all the experiences of raising two energetic boys. There were sports, little league, swimming & water polo and great times spent with our extended families. Both went on to graduate from college and Steve after several years at Microsoft is presently the CFO of tech startup in the Seattle area. We would love to tell you what he does, but don't understand a word of it. Scott on the other hand got a degree in Construction Management. We've always felt that this was for the sole purpose of being able to tell us everything we do wrong. For several years now Scott has been running our construction business in Moorpark and Bill goes in about once a week to return the favor. Between them we are the very proud grand-parents of three girls and two boys. The two oldest are students at Boise State University, two are in high school and one in Jr. High.

As we were gradually easing out of the daily activities of running the business, Nancy suggested that we needed to find an activity that we could do together and suggested ballroom dancing. Bill countered with "how about we try square dancing." That was 2008 and since then Square Dancing and the friends we have made have become a focal point of our lives.

In 2013 in a moment of weakness we said "sure we'll be Presidents for a year or two"....and the rest is history.




